About Kids On The Move



Kids On The Move is a non-profit organization that has provided support to families with children birth to age three in Utah County since 1986. The mission of Kids On The Move is “supporting the development of young children

and families in the community.” Services are provided to children with special needs, and also children from low-income families.

Services Include:

- Parent Training and Support
- Home Visits
- Group Activities for Parents and Children
- Resource Materials
- Therapy and Other Professional Services
- Health, Development & Nutrition Services

Support for Kids On The Move

Each year, Kids On The Move relies on volunteers and donations from individuals, businesses, and foundations to supplement the state and federal grants that support the programs. This allows Kids On The Move to provide services at little or no cost to families.

Early Intervention Program

Early Intervention provides support and services to families that have children under age 3 who have a disability or delay in development. Services are based on individual child and family needs and can include parent training, physical and occupational therapy, speech and language services, assistive technology, and nutritional services. Services may be provided at home or at the center.

Who is eligible for Early Intervention?

To qualify for services, children must be under age three, live in Alpine School District boundaries, and have a diagnosed disability or a significant delay in one or more of the following areas:

- Cognitive Development
- Language Development
- Social & Emotional Development
- Physical Development (including Motor, Vision, & Hearing)



Applying for the Early Intervention Program

If parents have concerns about their child’s development, they can call 221-9930 to set up a free developmental assessment which will determine eligibility for Early Intervention services.

Kids On The Move Early Intervention serves the Alpine School District area (Orem and the northern cities in the county). Families who live outside of the Alpine School District can call Baby Watch in order to determine which Early Intervention program provides services in their area. Early Head Start Program

What is Early Head Start?

Kids On The Move Early Head Start is a child development program that serves low-income families with children ages birth to 36 months, as well as pregnant mothers and their families. The goal of Early Head Start is to partner with parents and support them as they help their young children grow and develop.

Early Head Start Services

Positive, nurturing parent-child interactions are the focus of all Early Head Start services and activities. Home visits, classroom and family activities combine to promote healthy family functioning, school readiness, and family literacy. Through education and planning with parents, Early Head Start addresses all aspects of parenting and child development including: health, nutrition, safety, movement and music, social and emotional development and the importance of the relationship between parent and child.

Applying for the Early Head Start Program

Eligibility for Early Head Start services is based on family income and other qualifying factors. Parents must have a child under the age of three or be pregnant. Parents must live in Utah County. Call 221-9930 in order to obtain an application.
